

Forest Rules

All forest land managed by TPFL requires permit entry. The permit holder agrees to have read, understood and to fully comply with the information below. TPFL reserves the right to terminate any permit for people non-compliant with TPFL protocols and rules. Further consequences may include forest trespass and Police notification. A copy of the Access Permit must be carried while in the forest (electronic or printed).

Common Rules

Access time	The recreational use of TPFL Forests is only permitted outside of normal forestry operational hours,		
	i.e. during weekends, public holidays and during the hours of daylight in non-operational forests.		
	Weekdays entry is after 5pm, Monday to Friday in non-operational forests. Forests may be closed at		
	any time due to operations and hazardous conditions. Any variation will be case by case with the		
	permit holder.		
Biosecurity	All forest users must follow the Biosecurity Protoco l.		
Camping	Not allowed.		
Communication	All permit holders must be contactable by email and mobile phone and check permit websites		
	before entering the forest.		
Drugs & alcohol	It is not permitted to take or be under the influence of illegal drugs and alcohol within the forest.		
Fires	Starting fires or smoking in the forest is prohibited.		
Firearms	Unless you have a valid permit, the use of firearms, air rifles or archery equipment is prohibited in		
	the forest.		
Firewood	The cutting and collection of firewood and pine cones is by Firewood Permit only		
Forest zones	Users must stay within the Forest Zones as defined by their access permit.		
Hazards	The forest can be a hazardous place and a list of Hazards and Controls is provided. Hazards may		
	exist and TPFL will take all practical steps to identify and minimise risk as defined by their		
	responsibilities under the 2015 Health & Safety Legislation and Regulations. It is a condition of		
	entry that you report any hazard or activity which is illegal or may result in damage to the forest		
	environment. Hazardous conditions can arise due to a change in weather, operational activity and		
	unplanned circumstances such as meeting non-permitted road users.		
Health & safety	Anyone entering the forest has a responsibility to manage their personal safety and others they are		
,	responsible for while in the forest. They must monitor both the current and changing conditions		
	before and during entry in the forest. Where there is a risk to safety, parties must leave the forest		
	and immediately report any issues. All users must follow the standard Emergency Incident		
	Procedure.		
Hunting	Any form of hunting must comply with the Hunting Permit . Once you have a valid permit you can		
· ·	apply to the Weekly Hunting Ballot which allocates hunting blocks.		
Neighbours	Entry onto adjoining neighbours' land is not permitted from TPFL managed forests unless first		
-	gaining approval from the owner or occupier.		
Permits	Permits are non-transferable, maybe subject to restrictions, be revoked either verbally by individual		
	contact or public notice. A copy of the permit must always be carried (print or electronic copy), and		
	holders must comply with requirements when requested by TPFL.		
Poisons	Do not touch any baits, lures, carcasses or traps; note that dogs are particularly susceptible to		
	poison.		
Property loss	The permit holder is to indemnify TPFL for any damage or loss to property, of TPFL or any other		
- 1 - 1	person, caused by the permit holder or those under their control while in the forest.		
Restrictions	Access restrictions may be imposed at any time due to TPFL forest operation and seasonal		
	constraint.		
Risk & indemnity	All permit holders acknowledge and agree that they enter the forest entirely at their own risk and		
mon & macrimity	that TPFL or its officers or employees shall not be liable for any loss, injury or damage suffered by		
	the permit holder, whether that loss, injury or damage arises as a direct or indirect consequence of		
	any action or inaction of TPFL or its officers, employees, agents or sub-contractors.		
Roads	Road users must comply with best practices, NZ codes and rules when driving on forest roads;		
	including Vehicle Requirements and Radio Procedures for vehicles. Those on foot or cycling must		
	follow the same rules as on a public road.		
Signage	Obey all signage as displayed in the forest especially "Call-up", "Do not proceed" and "Road closed"		
Jigi lage	Unless you have been given verbal permission, you cannot enter into any operational site or go past		
	signage or barriers restricting through access.		
Troos & plants			
Trees & plants	It is illegal to damage, fell and remove trees and plants within the forest.		



Biosecurity Protocol

Machinery, equipment, personal footwear and clothing must be clear of causing any biological risk before entering the forest.

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Equipment usage	If any vehicle, equipment or clothing has been in use in forest areas outside of the Nelson Marlborough		
	region where there are known biological hazards it must be washed down, cleaned and disinfected prior to		
	use.		
Risk material	Remove all soil and plant debris and spray footwear, tyres or tracks and inside vehicle wheel arches with		
	disinfectant.		
Access approval	Approval is required prior to equipment being taken into any TPFL forest.		

Hazards and Controls

The following is a list of the hazards that you may encounter in the forest and the controls in place to manage them.
